The directories are the big project during the Winter months. I had 350 printed. We might have 5 left after distribution. These little booklets are so popular. I do have wonderful volunteers who proofread the document and many errors are caught. I want to thank all the lodges that assisted with the distribution of the directories this year. Looking ahead to next year, I will not have the luxury of waiting until March to publish. I am very excited about the convention in Coeur d' Alene so that means I will have to publish the directories at the end of January. I will be sending out reminders, but the lodges need to get their officers updated by the end of the year as that is what will go into the directory. The letters to the lodges soliciting their delegates will soon follow along with the new 2024 directories in mid-February.

The District Website. At long last, I have transferred ownership and control of the domains that the district has for its website. This is the "sonsofnorway2.com" and the "sofn2.com" domains. I do have a full backup of the original website running in case anything goes bang. Joan Wraalstad agreed at last fall's district board meeting to assume responsibility for design and maintenance of a new web site. The new website is now live at www.sonsofnorwayd2.org. The previous links have been directed to the new site.

The changes to the District 2 Bylaws made at last year's convention are close to final approval with the International Board with the final document being delivered to Mark Agerter at the conclusion of the Spring District 2 Board meeting. Mark Agerter, who is the International Board Vice Chair, tells me that a new template for Districts is being worked on now that the lodge bylaw template has been completed.

I hope all of you have been safe and healthy in this very challenging time. I hope to see many of you at Trollhaugen for the Steak fry.

District 2 has been holding Zone meetings this spring. This is an opportunity to get to know the officers and members from the lodges around the District. I did not make it to the Zone 6 meeting, but attended the other meetings. My part of the program was to remind members of the Cultural Skills program and to encourage the exchange of ideas for successful program and fund-raising ideas. We collected the ideas and will be sending a report on them out to the lodges shortly.

The Cultural Director's job is to encourage lodges and members to learn about their Scandinavian heritage, and to facilitate that learning by offering exciting programs and excellent resources. The best way to do that is to harvest ideas from the lodges themselves; to find out what has worked and what has not; what resources were useful; what human resources might be available, etc.

As the resources from International have dwindled, getting ideas and information from the lodges has become even more important. I send out ideas, links, and articles to the lodges' cultural chairs, or their substitutes, and request their input in return. I also have maintained contact with the Cultural Directors of the other Districts, who have been most accommodating in sharing ideas, etc.

There are 39 lodges in District 2, I have received responses from 8 lodges, and I get newsletters from 9 lodges (this includes my own lodge). I am certain that the other lodges have successful programs, have classes, have fund raisers, have people willing to pass on their skills. But no one knows about it unless you tell someone.

Most people who join Sons of Norway do it because they are interested in their heritage – the culture, the traditions, the crafts, the music, the food, etc. If we want them to stay in our organization, we need to provide those things and the best way to do that is to share our knowledge and resources. If we can involve members in the teaching and learning, we can keep them active.

A heartfelt thank you to all of you who have contributed to our bank of knowledge. If we keep working together, we WILL see dividends.

Hallo! I'm Darrin Lee and I'm proud to be your District 2 Foundation Director as well as a Governor and Treasurer of the Foundation. On behalf of the Sons of Norway Foundation Board of Governors, I want to thank our District 2 lodges and members for their financial support during the 'Together We Are The Future' fundraiser. You will recall that our first 'Together We Are The Future' fundraiser was in 2020 and the goal was to raise \$100,000 for the Foundation between October 2020 (Foundation Month) and January 15, 2021. The total donated by our lodges and members was \$137,000. Our 2021 goal was to raise \$150,000. Again, our lodges and members exceeded the goal by donating \$158,276. And our 2022 goal was to raise \$175,000. Our lodges and members responded by donating an amazing \$198,867!

- A total of 136 lodges in Districts 1 through 6 donated \$93,009 in 2022.
- In District 2, 12 lodges, including the District 2 lodge donated \$12,626.



As we have all heard there have been changes recently in the Home Office. Change is not always bad, and in this case, I believe it is setting us on the correct path for our future. Change is hard, as it has been in our personal lives the last few years as we adjust to the new normal. When you call back to the Home Office, different people might answer the phone. Please be patient, they are all trying to help, they're just learning a new job, which we all know is a challenge. We are trying to automate more, to make it more efficient for you, for our personnel, and for the tracking oversight that is required. Process improvements are always being looked at, with more of a self-service model, using online reports and forms. We are also working to outsource mail delivery to save money using bulk rate mailing, when we can.

With that being said I hope all of you got online and met the deadline of March 15th for your lodge D17 financial form which is required from all lodges annually. "Lodge of the Year" and "Family Lodge of the Year" forms were also due by March 15th. May 15th is just on the horizon as I am writing this and those that own real estate need to turn in a D18 financial form as well. Don't

forget the IRS wants its 990 Form and you need to send a copy of your confirmation to the home office for tracking that as well.

Membership is always a topic for Sons of Norway, some say we are the best kept secret. Home Office has used Facebook and other social media to continue to bring a steady stream of new members to our district and lodges, as well as new financial products, which is what our order was founded for, over 125 years ago to support one another.

The Districts have a "000- Central Lodge" and "999- Spirit New Century" that members can join when there is no local lodge in their immediate area, or a lack of available information about a lodge. It is our job as leadership to reach out to those members that have joined the 000 & 999 lodges and let them know what your local lodge has to offer. Local Lodge Vice Presidents can reach out to the District VP Joanne or any of the district officers to get a list of those members in your area, in hopes that you can reach out to those members and see if they would like to join your local lodge and all you have to offer.

International Board Vice Chair's Message - Mark Agerter



Greetings all. It has been a pleasure to serve as your representative on the International Board for the past seven years. Hard to believe it has been that long! I appreciate your confidence and support as we, as an organization, have navigated some very troubled waters since 2020 and the advent of the Covid pandemic, as have other organizations such as ours. I am glad to say that we were able to come through those trying times and I look forward to calmer, quieter waters going forward! Let me update you on the "state of the union" at the international level.

As you all know many changes have been made to Sons of Norway over the past few years. No change has been taken lightly and all have been necessary for the long-term health of our organization.

Probably the most difficult change was the elimination of 8 staff positions as of January 12 this year. Those were an internal sales support rep, an administrative assistant, 2 customer service reps, a technical support specialist, a fraternal membership specialist, a senior IT analyst and an agent contract specialist. This places somewhat of a strain on remaining staff as they adapt to assuming the responsibilities of these employees moving forward. But this move was totally necessary to align staffing levels with the 2023 budget.

The good news is that SON, through careful financial dealings and substantial belt-tightening, managed to make a profit last year and ended the year with an increase in surplus. Surplus is a

measure of solvency equal to the owner's equity in accounting terms. We are required to maintain sufficient surplus in order to back our policies in force. The belt-tightening was reflected in the staff cuts and other cost cutting measures. I am sure you have already heard that insurance sales take from 5 to 10 years to become profitable. So, these profit and surplus levels are not necessarily going to represent an ongoing trend yet. We may see further financial challenges for the next few years, until product sales from the last few years begin to make a profit. Be sure to look for the June Viking magazine for further information regarding our financial stability.

Financial topics of interest include:

- Upgrades to our claim-processing systems
- Successful disaster recovery testing to our IT systems
- Ongoing IT infrastructure upgrades to maintain high security and performance standards
- Website upgrades including a much-needed search function upgrade in response to member feedback
- The re-launch of the improved lodge directory on the website it is now searchable by state or zip code and it also works well on a smartphone or tablet
- Regular updates of all financial products to ensure regulatory compliance in all 38 states we sell in

Fraternal topics of interest:

- Tracking continues to ensure local lodge compliance with the filing of D17 lodge financial reports, D18 building association financial reports and 990 federal filings for both entities as well as D63 and D64 lodge and building association officer updates.
- Additionally, lodge liability insurance payments are past due. Lodges not paid up will have
 dues withheld starting in April until payments are made. This may seem harsh but unpaid
 assessments potentially put the entire organization at risk.
- Facebook continues to be a popular way to keep SON in front of people with 26,813 followers. In January alone we had 15,024 likes to our page. Top posts were Happy New Year and the Christmas cookie survey krumkake by the way!
- For those of you on Instagram we now have 2,868 followers.

We continue to enjoy great responses to our online postings. We are getting exceptional engagement rates of 44.1% to our January 2023 E-post, 58.6% to the latest Leadership Resource to lodge leaders and we have been seeing 67.7% buy-in from board and district officers. There is still room for improvement though and I highly recommend you take advantage of these resources even to the point of sharing with your members. They are very informative and will help you and your lodge keep abreast of changes, assist with operations, and increase efficiency and the enjoyment of all of our activities.

Foundation news:

- 66 grant apps were received this cycle, up from 42 in 2022 and 21 in 2021
- Scholarship applications were due March 1 and are ahead of last year in number
- Fundraising goals were easily met in 2022 with \$607,183 received, more than double the goal
- As of March 7, the 2023 total so far is at 50% of goal in only 2 months, a really good sign

• District 2 moved \$60,000 of the Sofie/Olson funds into the control of the Foundation. This is a long-needed change as it now allows donations to that fund to be tax deductible – a great incentive for future donors to continue to honor the legacy of these two women who contributed so much to Sons of Norway and District Two.

Other news you can use:

- The post office serving SON has had staffing shortages which have resulted in delayed or no mail delivery at all. This has delayed sending out invoices, statements, reports, and other critical mailings. This has also resulted in delayed receipt of payments and other correspondence. Going forward, the work-around for this is that the SON staff will now be picking up mail at the post office. So, if you experienced a delay in any mail-related issue, hopefully that is behind us.
- The Corporate Matters and Governance Committee (CMGC) has completed revisions of the Charter, Bylaws, Policies & Procedures document which is posted online for your reference. The next task on our agenda is to complete new voting procedures for the 2024 elections. This will also necessitate reviewing candidate applications and nominating committee documents and procedures. We hope to have these finalized by mid-year.
- Additionally, the CMGC has finalized the revised local lodge bylaws template. The update includes updated references to new chapter numbers in the new bylaws and procedures documents. So, we are now ready to have lodges that do not have bylaws incorporating all of the required clauses, specifically those pertaining to compliance and dissolution and distribution of assets, to bring your bylaws up to date. Lodges are required to use the current local lodge template, as found online in the members only section, to perform the updates. Revisions that do not include the new clauses and/or use the old bylaws template will not be accepted and will need to be re-done.
- And along that same line, in order to fulfill any and all reporting requirements that arise, please make sure that you and your lodge always utilize only the latest versions of any forms or templates, as found online. This would of course include current forms for the D-17, D-18, D63 and D64 reports.

My parting thoughts are that yes, there have been many changes in a very short time. Yes, there will be an adjustment period as people at headquarters assume the duties that have been done by other staff in the past. Yes, things are going to be somewhat different. But it is up to all of us to keep a positive attitude in the midst of these changes and to continue to support this organization that we know and love. It is still Sons of Norway and that has not changed, it will continue to be Sons of Norway. So, let's all hang in there through this adjustment period. Though somewhat different, things are going well for the organization and will continue to improve as time passes and the changes settle in.

District 2 Scholarship Report – Seth Tufteland

The Carl M. Saltveit Scholarship is awarded annually and covers the tuition, room, and board to attend the International Summer School at the University of Oslo. This is a permanent fund that is named to honor and remember Carl M. Saltveit Sr. who was a member of Grieg Lodge #2-015 in Portland, OR and former International Director.

There were no applications received for this scholarship for 2023. Please encourage your members to apply for this in the future. There is no age restriction. You must have completed 1 year of college and provide transcripts as proof.

We also have the Sofie/Olson Memorial Scholarship. This scholarship is named after Sherrie Sofie and Bernice Olson, district officers both of whom passed away while in office. The Sofie/Olson Scholarship is a self-sustaining fund and only the interest is used each year for scholarships. Our goal is to award a minimum of 3 scholarships each year, one to each of the Youth Camps (Camp Nidaros, Camp Normanna, and Camp Trollhaugen). This fund is now being held at the Foundation as it will be giving us a higher interest return allowing for more scholarships to be awarded. The Scholarship is still administered by District 2.

To help continue the growth of the Scholarship, we are selling Norwegian flag state stickers as a fundraiser. These will be available at most District 2 events at the cost of \$5 each. 100% of that goes directly to the principal of the fund. They can be purchased from the District Youth Director.

District 2 also has the Draxten Memorial Scholarship Fund which was established by the late Nina Draxten of Minneapolis in memory of her father, Bersvend Draxten, the first President of Sons of Norway. This fund is set up as a matching fund and can only be used to assist campers who have received a scholarship from their local lodge. The Draxten Fund can grant up to but not to exceed the amount awarded by the local lodge. These funds are managed by International Sons of Norway and distributed by the District Scholarship Chair.

It is a pleasure to serve on this committee and to award these scholarships to the deserving young people of our District.
