With regards to the maintenance of District governing documents, there has never been a clear path for District Members to easily access documents they may need for District Lodge processes and procedures. In an attempt to make these things more accessible, I have created a commercially-hosted website named <https://d2docs.info>. If you open this link in your web browser, you will be greeted with a screen containing three menu choices: Lodges; Officers; & Appendices.

Clicking on "Lodges" opens a Google Map with pins marking each current lodge in our district. Hovering over a pin will show the name of that Lodge and clicking that pin will show the address and meeting time for that lodge.

Clicking on "Officers" will take you to a list of PDF documents mainly describing the process for installing officers.

Clicking on "Appendices" will take you to a list of PDF documents covering the currently adopted processes governing each committee and task force of the District.

The hope is that making this information easily accessible helps each of us be more effective members of Sons of Norway District 2

Our VP has been working on compiling a new resource directory for the District, and I encourage every lodge to really think about WHO in your lodge might be a repository of cultural knowledge. That person who brings rosettes to the Jul party, that person who creates lovely Hardanger or chip carved items, someone who, maybe in the past, was part of a Scandinavian dance group... all of these people can be resources, at least for your own lodge. We need to pass these skills on to the next generations or we will lose the history and culture. And we will lose the Sons of Norway.

It's been an interesting five years as Cultural Director and I know the lodges will support the new Cultural Director just as they have supported me over the years.






## TUBFRIM helps those in need

In 1928, in Nesbyen in Hallingdal in Viken County, Norway, postmaster Ditlef Frantzen established Tuberkulosearbeidets Frimerkeforretning (literally "Tuberculosis work's postage stamp business"), abbreviated TUBFRIM. Its task was to collect and sell used postage stamps with the proceeds going to aid the eradication of tuberculosis among Norwegian children. In 1929, the organization showed its first profit of NOK 1500. Since then, profits have risen steadily, in all adding up to NOK 23 million.

Today, the charity is owned by Nasjonalforeningen for folkehelsen ("National Society for Public Health"). It collects and sells telephone cards in addition to postage stamps, and its profits are used to help children and young people with disabilities and handicaps, in addition to those with serious illnesses.

TUBFRIM is still located in Nesbyen, where it was founded.



We currently have applications that the Scholarship Committee are processing. Please encourage your members to apply for this in the future. There is no age restriction. You must have completed 1 year of college and provide transcripts as proof.

Our District has the Sofie/Olson Memorial Camp Scholarship. This scholarship is named after Sherrie Sofie and Bernice Olson, district officers, both of whom passed away while in office. The Sofie/Olson Scholarship Fund is a dedicated fund in which the principal from donations is left intact and only the interest used to for Camp scholarships.

It is the intent of the District 2 Board to actively renew our efforts to increase donations to this fund to provide a greater number of scholarships for our campers. We welcome contributions from Lodges and individual members. Your contribution to this fund is deductible under the IRS tax code relative to 501(c)(8) Fraternal Benefit Society, which states in section 170(c)(4) in part, "contributions by any individual (are deductible) if they are to be used exclusively for educational purposes."

Donors can contribute to the Sophie Olson fund by clicking the Sons of Norway Foundation's website's "Donate Now" button at <https://www.sofn.com/foundation/> and adding "Sophie Olson Fund" in the comments. Donors can also mail checks addressed to the **Sons of Norway Foundation** with "Sophie Olson Fund" in the memo to **1455 W. Lake St. Minneapolis, MN 55408**

Our goal is to award a minimum of 3 scholarships each year, one to each of the Youth Camps (Camp Nidaros, Camp Normanna, and Camp Trollhaugen). This fund is now being held at the Foundation as it will be giving us a higher interest return allowing for more scholarships to be awarded. The Scholarship is still administered by the District 2 Scholarship Committee. We are selling Norwegian flag state stickers as a fundraiser. These will be available at most District 2 events at the cost of \$5 each. 100% of that goes directly to the principal of the fund. They can be purchased from the District Youth Director.

District 2 also uses the Draxten Memorial Scholarship Fund which was established by the late Nina Draxten of Minneapolis in memory of her father, Bersvend Draxten, the first President of Sons of Norway. This fund is set up as a matching fund and can only be used to assist campers who have received a scholarship from their local lodge. The Draxten Fund can grant up to, but not to exceed, the amount awarded by the local lodge. These funds are managed by International Sons of Norway and distributed by the District Scholarship Chair.

It is a pleasure to serve on this committee and to award these scholarships to the deserving young people of our District.

All District Scholarship guidelines and applications will be sent out to lodge secretaries and district officers in the first part of November. They will be sent out again in January. Please ask your lodge to announce them.
